As I mentioned last month, our Fall Show will again be held at the Prince William County Fairgrounds in Manassas. VGCA



September Presentation – The English Rook Rifles

VGCA Member Chip Smith gave an excellent presentation on English Rook Rifles. A rook is a large black feathered bird related to ravens and jays whose range extends from Western Europe to Siberia. Large numbers of rooks can be a nuisance and they was often hunted for food and sport. In





England, a specific type of rifle was developed for small game in the 1880s which became known as the "Rook Rifle" – or sometimes referred to as the "Rook and Rabbit Rifle" (*see period ad at left*). These single shot rifles were chambered in black-powder cartridges in calibers between .22 and .38 (typically having both rifle and shot shell ammunition available) and were light and handy enough to be easily carried on walks through the country. Manufactured by such legendary British gunmakers as Holland & Holland, Westley Richards, and W.W. Greener, Rook Rifles were often elegant in design and featured superb balance, fit, and finish.

The Rook Rifle's popularity started to fade with increased popularity of the now-ubiquitous .22 Rimfire round, which was just as accurate, quieter, and much cheaper. By the 1920s, many Rook Rifles were converted to either smooth bore shotguns (often in .410) or sleeved to .22 Rimfire.


POTOMAC ARMS COLLECTORS INVITATION

FLOBERT PARLOR GUNS AND A HEINRICH SAUER SCHUTZEN RIFLE

Louis-Nicolas Auguste Flobert (1819–1894) of Paris, France invented the first rimfire metallic cartridge in 1845. It was a major innovation in firearms ammunition, at a time when the latest firearms used separate percussion caps, powder and ball. The rimfire cartridge combined all elements of ammunition in a single metallic (usually brass) cartridge containing a percussion cap, powder and a bullet, in one weatherproof package. Before that, a "cartridge" was simply a pre-measured quantity of gunpowder together with a ball (bullet), in a small cloth bag (or rolled paper cylinder) which also acted as wadding for the charge and ball.

Flobert also made what are called "parlor guns" or "saloon guns" for that cartridge. These Flobert rifles and pistols had a simple mechanism and were designed for indoor recreational target shooting in homes that had dedicated shooting parlors or shooting galleries. They are sometimes called "garden guns" because they were also used to deal with small pests in gardens. Flobert Parlor pistols came into fashion in the mid-19th century; they were typically single-shot pistols with a rather large, heavy barrel.

Flobert modified a percussion cap by swaging a hollow rim on the base of the percussion cap and filling the hollow rim with a fulminate priming compound, which was the propellant. He added a round ball as the projectile which produced the Bulleted Breech Cap (i.e. BB Cap). Flobert's work was the origin of the rimfire cartridge. Smith and Wesson later made improvements to the basic Flobert cartridge concept that increased its power and reliability, and introduced the .22 Short cartridge in 1857.

Flobert's initial action was a simple rolling block breech mechanism in which the breech was opened and closed by a breechblock that was hinged below the axis of the barrel – very similar to the Remington system. After cocking the hammer the block could be opened with a thumb lever, exposing the chamber for loading. It was pushed back to close the breech. Upon firing the falling hammer would hit the breechblock and firing pin and only the pressure of the hammer kept the breechblock closed. This system was suited only with low powered ammunition.

A number of improvements were made to the Flobert system. The first improvement was the addition of a pivoting extractor. This extractor covered the bottom half of the barrel, had a cutout for the cartridge body and was pivoted on a pin set in the frame. The extractor was manually operated by a thumb piece after the hammer had been cocked. The unlocked breech of the original Flobert system was kept.

The next improvement to the Flobert System is sometimes called the "Remington" system. It was similar to the Remington Rolling Block action and consisted of the addition of a pivoting breech block which was locked closed by the hammer falling into a notch or mating surface in the breech block. The breech block was fitted with a moveable firing pin and the extractor was generally pivoted on the breech block pivot pin and extracted the cartridge case when the breech block was rolled or tipped backwards.

The best and final improvement to the Flobert action was the Warnant system. This was a top swinging breechblock similar to a trapdoor action. The breech block pivoted upward to open and close the action and extract the fired case. Like the "Remington" system, the breech block is locked closed by the hammer falling into a slot or notch in the rear of the breech block. Both rifled and smoothbore barrels have been observed.

Most Flobert firearms were made in Belgium but Austrian, English, French and German guns are known. Flobert's system became immensely popular and were made in varied qualities, ranging from rough and poor quality to high quality, ornately decorated guns for the wealthy.

Belgian-made Floberts will often have Belgian proof marks ("E", "L" and "G" in an oval possibly surmounted by a crown). There may or may not be a maker's mark.

In Germany, Flobert guns were made in countless variations by a "cottage industry" centered on Zella-Mehlis, which is only about 5 miles from the gunmaking center of Suhl. Wholesalers ordered Flobert guns with several action designs - side push-button like the Stevens tip-up, a push-forward under lever, or a side lever or turning under lever. They came as single barrel smooth bores, small bore rifles, side by sides and even over/under superposed.

Most Flobert guns were quite inexpensive and many were not well finished. Many Floberts were made of very soft steel and designed to sell at the lowest possible price. Thousands were imported into the United States between about 1880 and 1914 as single-shot pistols, rifles and small-bore shotguns. Most of these used the Warnant system. Poor quality Flobert guns were correspondingly cheap. Around 1895 many were sold for less than \$3.00 in mail order catalogs. In 1920 the price of a new Flobert rifle was about \$2.50.


Flobert guns were chambered for the .22 BB Cap, .22 CB Cap, .22 Short, long or long rifle, and .32 Short, as well as 4.5mm, 5mm, 6mm, and 9mm Short rimfire. There were even some chambered in 2.7mm



Kolibri. The ammunition was highly corrosive and quickly damaged the rifling. Even Flobert guns in good condition are not safe to shoot with modern BB- or CB-Cap ammunition, so they are best kept strictly as wall hangers.

The low-powered Flobert cartridges do not contain any powder, the only propellant being the percussion cap itself. In Europe, the .22 BB Cap, introduced in 1845, and the slightly more powerful .22 CB Cap, introduced in 1888, are both called 6mm Flobert and are considered the same cartridge. The cartridges have a relatively low muzzle velocity of around 700 feet/second to 800 feet/second.

Not all Floberts were cheap and of poor quality. Some Floberts were made for the wealthier European trade. The people who could afford a shooting parlor in their homes wanted quality guns. These bucked the trend of cheap guns for the masses and as they were made for the upper crust of society they were of good fit and finish with ornamentation. One of these is pictured here. It was made by Heinrich Sauer in Vienna, Austria, Sauer (born 1822) was a gunmaker in Horn/Lower Austria and Vienna and among his products were high quality parlor guns using Flobert actions for wealthy patrons.


The Flobert system schutzen target rifle pictured above and below was made around 1860 and it is chambered for 6mm Flobert ammunition. The maker's name "*H Sauer Wien*" is inlaid on the top of the 25.6 inch (65cm) long octagonal barrel. It has a double set trigger and a target aperture sight. The decorated walnut stock has a large Tyrolean cheekpiece, a thumb piece near the wrist, scallop checkering, and mostly floral scrollwork and leafy meander scrollwork carving. The brass furniture is elaborately engraved, including the ornate double spur triggerguard with finger rests. It has a heavy schutzen type buttplate. This gun sold at auction by Joh. Springers Erben in Vienna, Austria for about \$590 (555 Euros), a high price for a Flobert but perhaps not high for a piece of this quality.


CMP UPDATE

THE CMP BOOKSTORE


The VGCA is a CMP Affiliated club. The VGCA club number is 026160.

NORMA .308 AMMUNITION SAFETY RECALL

Norma Precision, Inc., announced a voluntary recall of certain **.308 NORMA TAC 147 grain FMJ ammunition** made in Germany. The recall pertains to a specific SKU and corresponding lots of .308 Win Norma Tac 147gr FMJ ammunition due to possible performance inconsistencies in a small percentage of the ammunition. The company advises shooters to stop using .308 Win Norma Tac 147gr FMJ ammunition falls within the designated SKU and lots. Failure to do so could result in damage to your firearm and/or injury.

The SKU in question is 2422027.

The lot numbers in question are: 59KQ, 58KQ, 61KQ, 60KQ, 42MQ, 44MQ, 45MQ, 48MQ 62MQ, 50MQ, 56MQ, 42RQ, 64RQ, 71RQ, 65TQ, 66TQ, 68TQ, 69TQ, 50UQ, 44UQ, 50KR, 58UQ, 65UQ, 70UQ, 54KR.



The SKU and lot numbers are located in the white rectangle on the box.

Through its quality control procedures, NORMA identified possible inconsistencies with neck tension in a small number of cartridges within the ammunition SKU and corresponding lots (see above) that may allow the projectile to become loose including during transport. This could impact safe firearm performance leading to property damage and/or injury. This issue may potentially impact a small percentage of cartridges within the SKU and corresponding lots.

Once you have determined, based on its SKU and lot numbers, that your ammunition is one of the affected products, you can submit a return request online at <u>www.Normashooting.com</u>. When NORMA receives the returned, unfired, ammunition, it will refund your full purchase price for the returned, unfired, ammunition. This recall pertains only to the lot numbers listed by NORMA. The company will only reimburse customers for unfired product that is returned with these lot numbers.

VGCA GUNS OF DISTINCTION:

LUDWIG BOROVNIK BREAK ACTION RIFLE

The firm of Ludwig Borovnik has been making fine hunting guns since it was founded by the first Ludwig Borovnik in Ferlach, Austria in 1848. Since then it has remained a small, family run enterprise, hand crafting superb examples of the gun maker's art that are appreciated by the wealthy, royalty, and connoisseurs of quality firearms.



This custom-made single barrel stalking rifle in .243 caliber was manufactured in 1972 and was sold at a recent Joh. Springers Erben auction in Vienna, Austria for \$3,946. While not the highest grade, it is still a quality Borovnik product that is amply decorated. The 23.6 inch (60cm) long barrel has an octagonal breech tapering to the round, topped by a stepped engine-turned rib. It has open sights, a bright action, trigger plate lock with sideplates, Kersten crossbolt and additionally bolted lumps, side bolsters, a double set trigger and sliding tang safety. It has a German claw mounted Kahles Helia 39S1, reticule 7A





The bright side plates are decorated with medium scroll engraving and chiseled game scenes. There are roe deer on the right side, chamois on the left side, and a mouflon ram on the action bottom. The gun is signed in gold inlay by J. Heen of Copenhagen with a monogram on the triggerguard. The select grained stock has distinctive skip-line checkering on the fore-end and pistol grip and the buttstock checkpiece has a double fold. The fore-end, with its Deeley latch, is capped by a long horn tip.

REVIEW: THE YORK ANTIQUE ARMS SHOW

It has been said that going to a good antique arms show is like going to a good museum filled with rare vintage arms. The York Antique Arms show, held September 16-17 at the York Expo Center in York, PA meets that description. The two-day show, which took place on Friday and Saturday, was held in conjunction with the MAX Militaria Show, which was in a nearby building.

The Antique Arms Show had a number of nationally known dealers as well as local dealers and private sales. Many of the vendors specialize in antique arms, some of which are high end, and rarely come to Northern Virginia shows. However, York is not really that far and is well worth the drive.

I was there on Friday and the tables were loaded with enough interesting, unusual and rare guns and edged weapons of historical importance to stock a major museum. The number of rare historically significant

guns at this show was truly astounding. They included: a Reilly-Comblain .577 British breech loading trials rifle; an experimental breech loading .577 Snider built on a L.A.C. Pattern 1853: a US Navy marked Jocelyn revolver: an H.B. Weaver cut-down lever action, percussion "rolling block, front-end breech loading shotgun; the patent model for the scarce Merrill Latrobe & Thomas sporting rifle (circa 1856); and an extremely rare Confederate imported Whitworth Sharpshooters Rifle in .451 caliber. Only about 20 legitimate examples are known to still exist. This particular example was documented to a shipment of six to the Richmond Arsenal and was probably used in the Army of Northern Virginia. Another rarely seen gun was a Model 1875 Lee Vertical rifle. Only 143 of these were made by Springfield Armory.

Other notable offerings included a Morse breech loading alteration of a US Model 1816 Type III musket of which only 54 were produced, a cased set of elegant silvered steel Scottish flintlock pistols, and a cased set of flintlock pistols (in the original case) with an extra set of percussion locks made by Isaac Riviere of London (1781-1851). Riviere is best known for his patented "pistols without locks."

One of the most fascinating and rarest guns for sale was a Remington-made US Revenue Service Jenks Mule-Ear carbine with no Maynard tape primer. It is dated 1847 and marked U.S.R. The Revenue Service (ancestor of the US Coast Guard) purchased only 100 of these carbines and only three are said to exist today.

What was also good for buyers was that Friday had a light crowd, so you could closely examine the wares without being rushed or jostled. Also by going on

Friday rather than Saturday there was less potential competition for that prize piece for your collection. Vendors expected the crowd to be heavier on Saturday because many people were working on Friday. The venue lighting was excellent and there was plenty of room in the wide aisles. There was a food vendor inside but he had a limited menu.

A number of well-known auction houses, such as Cowan's, Milestone and Skinner, had tables at the show where they displayed some of the items to be sold in upcoming auctions.

The MAX Militaria Show which was in a nearby building in on the Expo grounds was held the same day and most likely drew some of the foot traffic away from the Antique Arms Show. Also, some of the dealers who would normally be at the Antique Arms show were at the MAX show instead. The Antique Arms Show had about 250 tables while the much bigger MAX Militaria Show had 258 registered table holders with over 800 tables. One drawback of the York Expo Center venue was that the two shows were in separate buildings that were really too far apart to walk from one to the other. I had to drive from the Antique Arms Show to the MAX show.

Steve Sylvia promotes the York Antique Arms Show and he is known for putting on high-class shows with top-notch vendors. The MAX show is promoted by the Ohio Valley Military Society, which also puts on the Show of Shows in Louisville, KY. Admission to the Antique Arms Show was \$10. The drive from Northern Virginia was not bad. I avoided Route 95 and instead went by way of Route 270 to Route 15 to Gettysburg, and then headed east on Route 30 to York. It was a pleasant drive with nice scenery and the road goes through a couple of quaint small towns with

buildings from the early 1800's (for those with an architectural interest). There are also plenty of antique shops, restaurants and even a gun store on the road between Gettysburg and York.

Member 1 shared his Beretta AR70 (*at right*). The select fire version of this rifle was developed in 1972 and was adopted by elements of the Italian military and police forces. It is chambered in 5.56 NATO (5.56x45) and replaced the BM59 (a box-magazine fed development of the M1 Garand chambered in 7.62 NATO). This particular semi-automatic AR70 was made in 1995.





Member 2 brought in a Carcano M1938 (at left). Chambered in then-new 7.35 Carcano caliber when initially fielded, the Italian military found that converting to a new caliber early in WWII was a logistical nightmare and swiftly switched caliber back to 6.5 Carcano in 1940. Most of the original carbines in 7.35 were then donated to Finland for use against the Soviet Union. This particular example is chambered in 6.5 and has the desirable "Bullseye" mark found on only about 10% of Carcanos.

Member 3 shared SIG P228 (*at right*), but not just any P228! This one was made specifically for the Flint, Michigan Police Department and is so marked with the department's shield on top of the slide. First introduced in 1988, this hammer-fired service pistol is chambered in 9mm Parabellum (9x19) and is double action/single action – that is, the first shot is a heavy double action pull and subsequent shots are a lighter single action trigger pull. However, those made for the Flint Police Department are double action only (DAO). It was replaced in the SIG catalog by the P229, whose milled stainless steel slide is better able to handle the higher pressures generated by the .40S&W and .357Sig calibers.





Member 4 brought in two U.S. martial flintlock pistols - a Simeon North Model 1819 and an Evans Model 1826 (*left*).

The Model 1819 is a .54 caliber single shot pistol. On June 12, 1819, the U.S. Ordnance Department showed Simeon North a sample pair of pistols from the Harper's Ferry Armory. North then produced a pistol similar to that of Harper's Ferry with a few alterations. He signed a contract with the U.S. on July 21, 1819 to produce 10,000 pistols. Ultimately, a total of 20,400 were made. This pistol introduced the iron swivel ramrod. It was created because wooden ramrods frequently fell out of pistols and were lost. An unusual feature of this model, not repeated on any other U.S. martial pistol, is a sliding safety bolt at the rear of the lockplate which locks the hammer at half-cock while the frizzen is down covering the priming pan.

The Model 1826 is a .54 caliber Navy pistol. Less than 1000 Model 1826 pistols were produced by W.L. Evans of Valley Forge, PA around 1830-1831. The Evans-produced pistols are nearly identical to the Model 1826 Navy pistols manufactured by Simeon North, and also feature an iron swivel ramrod. The only variations are in the markings on the lockplate. The Model 1826 Navy pistols are also similar to the Simeon North US Model 1819 Army pistol but on a reduced scale with a shorter barrel and shorter overall length. According to Smith and Bitter, more pistols of this model were converted to percussion than any other model and the Model 1826 Navy, either North or Evans, is seldom found in original flintlock.

Member 5 displayed his Swiss Versuchsgewehr 1908, a test rifle made by Waffenfabrik Bern to develop a new spitzer cartridge for the Swiss infantry. The test cartridge was the 7.55x55VGP08, the direct predecessor to the finally adopted Swiss GP11 (1911) 7.55x55 round.

This straight-pull test rifle has two forward locking lugs, but the locking sleeve has three relief holes for weight reduction. The ribbed box magazine holds 6 cartridges. Many of the Rifle 1908 features eventually were adopted for the standard IG1911.

The rifle is easily identified from other Schmidt-Rubin models that have two parallel relief cuts, of the same length, set an equal distance from the top of the receiver. The Model 1908s relief cuts are of different lengths. The 1908 also used a Model 1899/1900 Short Rifle magazine with an external reinforcing rib along the bottom and ends of the magazine, along with the four drain holes in the bottom of the magazine. The rib and holes were omitted from the later simplified 1911pattern magazines.

There were 900 test rifles (order approved in January 1909) made in two different barrel twists of 230mm (1 in 9") and



270mm (the normal 1 in 10.63"). This rifle indicates the barrel twist "7,5 - 270". Twist rate testing continued into the early converted 96/11's and early 15,000 1911 rifles.

There was also a very uncommon carbine variation or Versuchskarabiner 08.
